Abstract

Many literary works have been written by diaspora writers who settled in different

countries. South Asian diaspora writers depict the immigrants' problems and conflicts in

their novels and short stories. Jhumpa Lahiri is one of the second-generation

immigrant's writers. Her works describe the psychological trauma of immigrants. Her

characters suffer from displacement and alienation. This study aims to examine from a

post-colonial perspective how identity crisis is depicted in Lahiri's two novels The

Namesake (2003) and The Lowland (2013). It also delves into these novels to explain

the different diaspora problems associated with identity crisis such as loneliness,

dislocation and nostalgia. The characters suffer because they live away from their

homelands. They have to speak a different language and adopt a different culture which

leads to their alienation and suffering. This thesis discusses the characters' identity

crises and their success or failure to create a hybrid identity. Different concepts like

mimicry, third space and hybridity will be used in analyzing the characters' identities.

The thesis also aims at tracing where the characters (males and females) meet or differ

in their cultural struggles and their identities crises.
